# YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

Work Placement: Monday, 8, to Wednesday, 17 July. Back in school for Final Debrief: Thursday, 18 July.

I have now made the final arrangements for this year's Work Experience programme, which are as follows:

- discuss with their supervisor how they can get the most out of the Work Experience.

There are still a few boys who do not have a Work Experience placement organised. I may still be able to help them, even at this late stage. However, boys who do not have a placement for the above dates **are expected to attend school as normal.**

Hockey:

### Football:

Finals and Officials: The football season ended with disappointment this year as only one of our teams reached a final. However, after appearing in three of the last seven Blues Cup Finals, the school was well represented again. Despite the Year 11 team going out to St Thomas Aquinas in the quarter final, the school still had a presence in the final. It was not the team this time but an official. After a late withdrawal through injury, Year 10 pupil, Frank Walker, stepped in as one of the referee's assistants. The match was refereed by former Premier League referee and Old Boy, Mike Reed. Mike is now a League Referees' Assessor and Coach to six Premier Referees, two of whom officiated at this season's two major finals, the FA Cup and the Worthington Cup. These were, according to Mike, 'very good days out'. Mike was very complimentary about Frank's performance, particularly as he made some crucial decisions in front of very partisan supporters.

If any boys in school over the age of fourteen are interested in following in Mike and Frank's footsteps, the Regional Referees' Co-ordinator will be visiting the school in the near future to inform about a local course. <u>Football in Italy</u>: After a scenic journey through the snow-covered Alps, Mr Preece emerged as draughts champion and Mr Kafai emerged from under his duvet. The boys settled in well at the hotel and were able to practise their French as they mixed with students from Marseilles.

The first day began well as we approached Venice by water from Punto Sabbatim. We were able to enjoy the cultural delights of the famous old city and indulge in the favourite pastime of English tourists ... shopping! On making our way to the waterside stadium the boys got their first experience of football Italian-style as we had to pass through numerous checkpoints manned by heavily-armed and baton-wielding police. was only one team going to win this game as the staff exhibited their full range of skills. However, the goal of the game was a classic header by *Sam Walsh* from a Beckham-like *James Coyne* cross. In the evening we played two games against Club Lido di Jesolo. Year 8 started well with the 'goal of the tour' being scored by *Oliver Hartill*, but the Italians proved stronger at the end to win 2-1. Year 9 faced a physically stronger opposition and, despite putting up fierce resistance, went down 5-0. *Daniel Rumble* starred in midfield, and *James Pugh* came closest to scoring with a shot from 35 metres. The travelling band of flag-waving England supporters gave fanatical support throughout.

Tuesday began with a tour of the summer villas of the ruling Doges of Venice. After passing several disappointing residences, the boys were shown around the magnificent Villa Pesini. We then travelled on for a little more sightseeing and shopping in Padua. In the evening we played the very impressive Academy team of AC San Dona. The trip home seemed a long journey, but spirits were lifted by a cosmopolitan gastronomic feast – at McDonalds!
