Dear Parents

The Christmas tree is decorated in the hall and the Music Department will entertain us in a festive spirit on Monday evening, 8 December (please come – enjoy the performances and win a huge PTA hamper in the raffle), and we wish all those linked with the school a very happy time of year.

The end of term also, however, brings the departure of Mick Brett who, as Deputy Headteacher, has been a pillar of strength to me and a dedicated friend to all boys and staff, offering generous and caring support and wise counsel to us all since he joined us over five years ago. He leaves with our thanks and best wishes as he embarks on his new phase of life.

This Newsletter brings a number of administrative requests so please study each of these before you get to the interesting parts that follow.

If you have changed address or especially your telephone number within recent months, please check that the school office has a record of the change; we always seem to have out-of-date numbers when it is most urgent to contact parents.

There is a letter about data protection that you may feel is important at the end of this Newsletter.

Whilst we welcome getting to know parents better, it always helps if appointments are made beforehand. Members of staff usually have commitments that they cannot leave, and it can create real difficulties and embarrassment if parents come without checking that someone will be free to see them.

As winter approaches, we have to anticipate possible school closure because of bad weather. Decisions on school closure, including KNBS, will be taken centrally by the Chief Education Officer by 6.45 am and announced on BBC Radio WM and on BRMB.

It may help at this stage if parents know our position on snow-balling. We have great concerns about possible injuries, especially to the eyes, but it is unrealistic for us to expect boys not to enjoy their winter fun. Our rules are that boys can only throw snow on the field and not near the buildings; when the snow is melting and "snowballs" are effectively balls of ice, they must not throw at all. Boys who



do not wish to be involved are allowed to stay inside the building. In the past, I have suspended boys, whether on the school site or out of school, if they have caused danger with snow. Please talk to your sons about their responsible behaviour at this time of year.



VISIT TO THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S PARLIAMENT

The pupils enjoyed the experience of going to the YPP and hearing real people talk about their feelings. One of the reports written by the pupils involved is reproduced below.

My Day at the Young People's Parliament

On the morning of the visit I was not sure how to feel or what to expect. Would it be a big presentation or just an ICT production? I had no idea.

When I arrived at the Young People's Parliament, I began to feel excited. I entered the Think Tank area and found that about half a dozen other schools had been invited. After lunch we had another presentation, when different people had the opportunity to state their views on the people who had come round to talk to our groups. We had another vote to see whether our views about religion had changed, and most of the answers were different this time.

Murphy took over the scoring mantle as the game progressed, and KNBS ran away with a 60-4 victory: a record score for Year 9 at KNBS. Well done, boys!

Year 9 v King Edward VI Five Ways School: KNBS lost 24-23. A very disappointing result for the lads. If we had played anywhere near the standard we are capable of, we would have come away with the spoils, but we missed too many easy chances. With one minute to go, we were winning by one point, but we gave the ball away, the opposition ran down, scored, cleared, the whistle blew and off we trundled in the van. For the second time this year we have lost by one point.

<u>Year 10</u>: The team has played two games and lost two: a disappointing start to the season. We need to improve on this standard.

Football:

Year 7 5-a-side Tournament: Nine Year 7 boys travelled to Shenley Court to play in the knockout stages of the Wagon Wheels 5-a-side Tournament. They faced stiff competition from the hosts, Shenley Court, as well as Bishop Challoner Sports College and Frankley Community College. In the first game we played Shenley, and the two goalkeepers were the difference, with Jack Bentley performing well. We eventually ran out 2-0 winners. In the second game we came from 1-0 behind to defeat Bishop Challoner Sports College 3-1. This set up a final against Frankley, who had also won both of their first two matches. Our boys knew they had to win to proceed in the competition, as Frankley had a superior goal difference. The boys took the game to Frankley, and only some fine goalkeeping kept the score down to 2-0 for KNBS, who now proceed to meet Turves Green Boys' Technology College, Baverstock Sports College and Four Dwellings High School.
