Congratulations to *Justin Mullings and Greg Martin* of Year 11, who handled their performance on stage in a most professional manner. The presenters talked us through and demonstrated several hi-tech investigation methods, including facial recognition techniques and DNA testing. They were, I am pleased to say, successful in catching the "baddie".

OUTDOOR PURSUITS VISITS

The following Outdoor Pursuits residential visits have been organised for this year:-



Skiing and Snowboarding course to Salt Lake City, Utah, USA, this February half-term for thirty-seven boys from Year 8 through to Year 12. Intensive training at the Snowdome has prepared

these boys for knee-deep powder runs in the Rocky Mountains where fifteen boys will be skiing and twenty-two boys will be snowboarding the Olympic ski resort and backbowls of Utah.

Nearly ninety boys from Year 7 have paid deposits for the five-day Outdoor Pursuits course in Newquay from Monday, 7 July. They will have an opportunity to try body boarding and surfing in the famous Fistral Beach surf, abseiling and zip wire across the sea cliffs, mountain biking upriver from Padstow, quad biking the largest course in Britain, canoeing, sailing and windsurfing on Stithians Lake.

Fifteen boys in Year 8 who have learnt to dinghy sail at KNBS during their games lessons will be going to the United Kingdom Sailing Academy in Cowes, Isle of Wight, for five days from Monday, 30 June, to improve their dinghy sailing skills in the Solent and pick up RYA national qualifications.

Twenty boys from Year 9 will be going to the Cornwall Outdoor Education Base in St Just in Roseland near Falmouth for seven days from 23 May



for expedition training in canoes and dinghies culminating in overnight bivouacs.

Sixteen boys from Year 10 will be selected to join the coastal dinghy sailing weekend at Brightlingsea from Friday, 13 June. These five-mile passages to Clacton or Marewell across the Essex Blackwaters are always exciting under full spinnaker and demand team cooperation amongst the crews.

A different group of fifteen boys from Year 10 have been invited to the Birmingham LEA mountaineering school at Ogwen Cottage, North Wales, for six days from Sunday, 6 April. These boys will be rock-climbing, mountain walking and sea cliff girdling with the best mountaineering guides in Britain.

If our dinghy race training is good enough over the next few months, we hope to send a race squad of twelve boys from KNBS to the National School Sailing Association Regatta at Weymouth during the first week of the summer holidays to represent Team Birmingham.

Dinghy sailing will resume at Edgbaston Reservoir after Easter for boys in Years 8, 10 and 11.
