'Participation to reach Potential'

Cricket

Year 8: Our first match of the year saw us entertain Aston Manor in the Cup. After winning the toss, we put them in to bat and kept their score down to 48 all out off 17 overs, with some great bowling. The best came from *Adam Freezer*, with one wicket for no runs off 3 overs, and *Steven Jacques*, with 4 wickets for 5 runs off 3.4 overs. With such a low target we struggled at first to make any impact. In fact, we only looked like winning thanks to some poor bowling from the visitors. We were 44-5 in the last over and somehow lost 2 wickets with the first 2 balls, but two wides from the last two deliveries saw the scores go level and KNBS win by losing fewer wickets (the third time this team has managed that).

Our next match brought a strong Moseley side to the school. They batted first, and this time our fielding let us down, as they scored 79-3 off 16 overs.

Requiring 5 runs an over to win, we tried our hardest to pull off what would have been a great victory. However, we struggled to keep up with the required run rate, although Steven Jacques scored an impressive 29, including one massive 6. We fell 14 runs short of our target, finishing 65-4 off our 16 overs

We were desperate to return to winning ways, and our next match was against Bournville at home. We lost the toss, and Bournville made us bat – something they came to regret. With an impressive second wicket stand of 96, Steven Jacques (34) and Adam Freezer (27) set us on our way to a Year 8 best of 119-3 off 20 overs. Bournville battled in vain to keep in the game and were finally bowled out for 45. KNBS won by 74 runs, with *Michael Ralph* coming from keeping wicket to bowl 3 overs for one run and grabbing 3 wickets.

Year 8 Cricket Festival: We attended this festival on a high after the recent demolition of Bournville. In a three-team tournament, we faced Kings Heath and Bishop Challoner. Our first game was against a very strong Kings Heath team who batted first and scored 82-6 off 15 overs, with some good fielding from Steven Jacques and *Joe Fox* keeping the score down. However, our batting line-up was in for a shock, as Kings Heath unleashed their main weapon: a lad who plays County Cricket and who could bowl at 75 mph. We fought hard but could not keep up with the run chase, ending up on 70-9 with *Tom Caesar* top-scoring on 20 – therefore, losing by 12 runs.

Against Bishop Challoner we were put in to bat, and a poor display by the top order saw us at one stage 40-6. However, Joe Fox came to our rescue with a rapid 19, to leave us a good total of 76-8 off 15 overs. After a nervous couple of overs our bowlers and fielders finally got their act together, and we finished off Challoner for 53, with Adam Freezer claiming 3 run-outs with direct hits, leaving us victors by 23 runs.

Kings Heath quickly destroyed Bishop Challoner, leaving us runners-up in this year's festival.

Well done to all those who played!

Year 9 v Bournville: It was the boys' first game of the season owing to many rain delays. The extra time practising had definitely paid off, because we were able to record a thumping victory.

We put Bournville in to bat, and their openers managed to put on 20 runs without loss. Then *Beech* struck. He bowled with pace and accuracy, and he managed to tempt their best batsman to edge one behind to a diving *Bateston*. *Blaymires* kept it tight at the other end, putting pressure on the other opener to lash out and find himself trudging back to the pavilion (22-2). *Taylor and Byford* then bowled with great accuracy: Taylor picked up 4 wickets and Byford 3, as we reduced Bournville to 30 all out. A great display of bowling, and certainly one of the best I have seen in the last five years at KNBS.

Byford and Bateson opened the batting and took their time to reach 31 without either of them getting out. A great victory by an improving team.

I have often cited the importance of practice in this newsletter, but this is no more evident than with this team. I watched them at breaktime on Monday practising their batting and bowling because, as they said, 'they really want to win something this year'. With this attitude they will give every team a run for their money, especially if Taylor keeps bowling his special delivery, which he described in his own words as 'the first ball with swing and half spin'?? Nearly, Karl!

Year 9 v Bishop Challoner Sports College: A strange game in many ways! The boys had braced themselves for a tough encounter against a local sports college. However, it was all over in forty-five minutes.

After putting Challoner in to bat, we reduced them to 12-5 after 16 overs. This was mainly as a result of some fantastically tight bowling.

Murphy and Green opened the innings and closed the game out in two overs with a couple of big hits. **Restall** took his first wickets of the season, as did **Sheehan.**

Well done, lads!

Year 9 v Baverstock: After putting Baverstock, another Sports College, in to bat, we found it difficult to put their batsmen under pressure as they scored continually through their 16 overs. All of the bowlers bowled relatively well without really excelling themselves. Just as the game seemed to be drifting away from us, Byford managed to take 2 wickets and engineer 3 run-outs. Baverstock lost 3 wickets in the last over to reduce them to 62 all out.

KNBS batted well again, though still not up to our usual standard. Then Beech took control and scored 26 to steer us home with 4 overs to spare.

We have now played 3 and won 3 in the league and have a real chance of taking the championship.

Well done, boys: Beech, Blaymires, Bateson, Byford, Aftab, Sheehan, Gately, Green, Laidley, Murphy, Restall, Iqbal, Greaves and Taylor.

Year 10 v Lordswood: Only one word can describe our opening to the cricket season – rain! However, we have had some excellent practice sessions. This is why our defeat by Lordswood was even more hurtful. We bowled well, reducing them to 71-6 after 14 overs, with *Osman Ahmed and Daniel Page* bowling fast and straight and extracting lift from a sodden pitch. Our batting was disappointing, with only *Partridge and Adams* scoring any real runs. When we lost our last wicket with the score on 61, the lads looked thoroughly dejected.

Year 10 v Bournville: After putting Bournville in to bat, we found it very difficult to contain their obvious batting flair. *Page* was his usual - accurate and fast - but our other bowlers all seemed to have an 'off day' at the same time. Our fielding was poor, as was our throwing, which cost us an extra 15 runs. Bournville finished on 93 for 5.



After some harsh words by Mr Preece, we battled with a real determination. Adams and Partridge started well, and it soon became apparent that Bournville had no confidence in their bowling.

All the way through our innings we kept scoring, giving us a chance of victory. *Millard* then hit a ball that landed near Cotteridge to put us close to the target score. Page came in at the end and steadied the ship to give us a famous victory.

Well done, lads! We did not perform very well, but we showed real guts and determination.

Athletics at Norman Green Stadium, Solihull, on 8 June:

KNBS were invited to a prestigious athletics competition alongside some of the top schools in the Birmingham area (KE Camp Hill, KE Fiveways, KE Stratford, Handsworth Grammar and Fairfax). The boys, as always, did themselves proud with the important issue being that the boys should do their best and not worry about their position in the competitions.

'Tiny' Tyrone Renford was our first competitor in the very first race to record a personal best and a fantastic victory: he came first in the Year 8 800 m. He has shown a real talent for this event and will surely go on to bigger things.



Our other two victories on the evening belonged to *Joe Howes* (10.13 m in the triple jump) and *Jack Stoker* (41.27 m in the javelin).

Berhon Laidley recorded a second in the triple jump and a third place in the high jump. Tyrone also managed a third in the long jump, and **Steven Jacques** came third in the high jump.
